

JEEVAN JYOTHI FEDERATION

20 years •12 projects •33600 families •2 districts

1978 Rev. Dr. George D'Souza, feeling the need for a women's platform for their empowerment, started organizing women into self help groups of 12 to 20 members & with savings of Rs. 2/- per week. Self help groups increased from 20 to 200 and 200 to 600, Cluster Federations were formed at the Grama Panchayath level with the representatives from 20 SHGs.

1996 Mahila Jyothi Okkuta, a federation for women of Hassan District was created

1998 District level mother federation for 2 districts called Jeevan Jyothi Federation was formed. initially It began with a share amount of Rs. 500/-. Weekly meetings gave an opportunity to share their grievances, issues, family customs and celebrations and to take important decisions. Awareness and training were conducted on Concepts of self help group, women atrocities, domestic violence, Health and Hygiene, roles and responsibilities, time management, income generation activities and so on.

2008 women felt the need for sustainability and access to financial options for higher education of their children, construction of house, marriage, agriculture and so on and came up with a solution to contribute a share amount of Rs. 1000/- per SHG to avail more loan facilities, creating a share capital from 498 SHGs.

2016 As the volume of transactions increased and the need for stability was felt among the women they decided to raise the share amount to Rs 4000. As per the norms, the Jeevan Jyothi Federation was registered in Hassan under the Cooperative societies Act, 1960 bearing Registration No. 100/2016-17. As of now, the Federation functions with 17 independent board members and quarterly meetings are conducted to discuss on the issues and future of the Federation. Today women are in a position to save Rs.100/- per week and the federation is lending up to Rs 1 lakh for various IGPs and other needs of the women.

A very hard working Jayamma from Mudbagilu gave her daughters in marriage and got them settled in their life. Now her 70 year old husband depended on her. She too was ageing and could not go to work. . She had joined Kaveri SHG in the year 2000 with a weekly saving of Rs 10. This savings and the SHG came to her aid. She started Areca nut Nursery in 2015 with a loan of Rs. 10,000 from her savings. With a loan of Rs. 25,000 in 2017 from Jeevan Jyothi federation and she started pepper nursery along with Areca nut. Today she earns a profit of Rs. 35,000 in a year.



EMPOWERMENT OF SOCIO-ECONOMICALLY POOR AND DISADVANTAGED WOMEN

15 years • 5 phases • 2 taluks

Misereor, Germany through KROSS, Bengaluru

This project was started in the year 2003 supported by Misereor Germany through KROSS, Bengaluru.

Main Objective of the Project

Sustainable development of the marginalized section of the society, enable their rights and enjoy safety and secured life free of atrocities and violence contributing towards Women empowerment.

2 taluk level federations and 7 Cluster Federations are formed encompassing 2226 women. Out of these, vanitha Jyothi and spoorthi cluster Federations are registered under co-operative societies Act and received grant of 1 lakh each for their sustainability from the Government.

More than 32 cases of voilence and atrocities against women have been registered, out of which 23 cases are resolved after our interventoin

 PROGRAMME ON POLICE GASTHUSABHE IN MELAGODU AND HERAGU. 600+ SHG MEMBERS
 AND COMMUNITY MEMBERS PARTICIPATED. THE POLICE GAVE AWARENESS ON WOMEN RIGHTS
 AND PREVAILING PRO-WOMEN LAWS AND REGULATIONS. ON ACCOUNT OF THIS, A CORDIAL
 RELATIONSHIP IS ESTABLISHED WITH THE LOCAL POLICE AND WOMEN.

Sundaramma, member of Spoorthi SHG of AG Koppalu has a poultry farm where she employs 2 women and earns a daily profit of Rs 1500. She works as Asha worker for AG Koppalu and Bandihalli villages. She avails disability pension of Rs 1200 per month. She succeeded in attaining her land from the family on legal grounds. She availed free housing from government. She is educating her daughter in English medium school. Trainings on leadership, government facilities and disabled rights and entitlements had developed in her a need for self-reliance. She was deserted by her husband with her newly born girl child at the age of 24. She thanks CMSSS for the timely help and guidance.



EMPOWERING COMMUNITIES FOR EFFECTIVE GOOD GOVERNANCE

3 years • 15 villages • 1 taluk

Manos Unidas, Spain

The specific objective of the project was capacity-building the project staff and community members in order to help people to get their rights and entitlements. 690 trainings were conducted on different topics to women, men and children with 31,817 participants. After our intervention, beneficiaries were able to tap government resources to a tune of Rs.3,60,11,500/- in two years period.

2017-18

387 trainings are conducted with 16,114 participants enhancing their knowledge on the formation of ward development committees, Civic foras and its roles and responsibilities, panchayath Raj Institutions, Public Distribution System, Government Schemes, Right based approach, Documentation and book keeping and Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Act (MGNREGA)

- 6 Cluster level federations are formed and are functioning as per the norms, availed loans from Jeevan Jyothi Federation & other banks to a tune of Rs. 25,00,000/- and started income generation activities like petty shop, purchase of vehicle, cow rearing, goat rearing etc. The repayment of loan is Rs. 18,00,000/-

Mrs. Renukamma, Santhveri joined Surabhi SHG in 2011. Her husband was the sole breadwinner but her son's illness made it impossible to make ends meet. She was very much interested in the trainings on SHG concepts, Ward development committees, leadership, right based approach, social audit etc. Today she is an elected member in Kamanadurga Grama Panchayath. She has helped 10 children with scholarship of Rs.1000/-. She is also elected as the president of Prathibha Mahasangha.



MAINSTREAMING OF DIFFERENTLY-ABLED

9 years • 3 phases • 2 districts

Community Based Rehabilitation Forum, Bengaluru

2007 started with Community Based Rehabilitation for persons with disabilities, a micro project in 130 villages of Kadur and Chikmagalur taluks.

2007 Started spreading awareness on disability friendly environment and social inclusion to heads of the institutions in Chikmagalur. A slow attitudinal and structural change is observed in the schools and institutions making them disabled-friendly

2010 CBR Forum India requests to extend the project to 2 districts of Hassan and Chikmagalur becoming its pilot Project in whole of India for Mainstreaming of persons with disability

2015 82 ramps and disabled friendly toilets were built in the operational area

2012 for the first time 36 Village Disabled Peoples organization(VDPOs) were formed in Marianagar and Kadur regions

2013 survey was made of 3997 PWDs in our operational area, indentifying persons with locomotor, low vision, visually impaired, speech and hearing impaired, mental illness, mentally retard and multiple disabilities.

2007-2010 focused on awareness on disability, awareness on disability Rights and Act, Empowerment through organising and availing facilities from the government through street plays, awareness & health camps.

2015 Three Taluk level DPOs were formed in Arkalgud, Kadur and Mudigere Taluks. Divyajyothi disabled peoples cooperative society, Arkalgud was registered and availed rs 1,27,000/- for their sustainability from the government.

2016 district level Disabled peoples organization was formed in 2 Districts as Sarvodhaya vikalachethanara okkuta, Hassan and Chikmagalur.

By 2017 155 VDPOs, 9 TDPOs and 2 DDPOs are actively functioning in Hassan and Chikmagalur Districts.

Venkatesh, 38, a person with locomotor disability and a passion for art once depended on Rs 150 daily wage. Though deprived by poverty, his love to paint found wings when introduced to Disabled Peoples Organisation by CMSSS. Three years of motivation, trainings and awareness has changed Venkatesh. He receives disability pension, has built his own house through government schemes and supports his wife and children, working as an Art Lecturer at Shanthala Arts College, Hassan.



SAVE A FAMILY PLAN

24 years • 3 phases • 2 districts

Seva Family Plan Kerala through SASP, Canada

1994 Rev. Dr. J.B. Sequeira, Then president of CMSSS approached Save a Family Plan Trust, India for the implementation of this program as a charitable activity by giving each family Rs 60 per month under the name 'Regular beneficiary program'

2003 Introduced participatory approach with specific guidelines on selection of families. The membership into self help groups of CMSSS became mandatory to handhold the family through other programmes.

2004 Income generation activity became must for all the families.

2010 onwards it adopted a totally new approach. The name of the programme was changed from Regular Beneficiary Program to Family Development Program with following guidelines: Every family should have a complete profile with documents, baseline data, six year plan, yearly budget, cash flow, fund withdrawal applications, budget and fund request signed by Director, Coordinator and animator, letters sent to benefactors and received by beneficiaries

2014 onwards this plan was focused to 9 panchayaths at a time. families were grouped into three regions, namely, Hassan, Chikmagalur and Balehonnur, monitored by 3 animators. 1300 families have been supported to get basic facilities, children's education, livelihood initiatives, medical treatment, awareness on social issues & availing their entitlements from the government.

For Saldanha family, Raghu was the sole breadwinner, poverty was challenging and their 2 children's education was a question mark. Today they earn 1000/week, Metilda teaches tailoring to 5 women, makes profit by stitching clothes, their daughter pursues nursing and son is in 5th std. It all changed with Save a Family Plan. Training, financial aid to buy a machine and motivation to start a tailoring unit of her own was all they needed. She has renovated her house and invested in a Zigzag sewing machine. Metilda & Raghu look up towards a better future now.



PROVIDING ENTREPRENEURIAL LIFE TRAINING FOR THE SCHOOL DROPOUT YOUTH

6 years • 1 project • 2 districts

Functional Vocational Training Research Society (FVTRS)

2007 Fr Peter Brank introduced this project to help the unemployed youth in the operational area with the help of the then director of FVTRS Mr. Albert and Mr Felix D'Souza, The program manager

The main objective was to identify the school dropouts and equip them with livelihood skills.

Tailoring, Driving and 4-wheeler mechanism and Beautician Trades were introduced

In 5 years, 450 school dropouts have benefitted from these trainings. Out of these, 360 unemployed youth have found employment or are self- employed. The employment rate is 80%.

Garment Making: 1st batch for garment making was organized at Beerur with 15 Trainees. The 2nd batch of Garment making was organized at Gonibeedu of Mudigere Taluk.

Beautician Course: 1st batch of Beauticians was conducted from March to august in Chikmagalur. The 2nd batch too was organized in Chikmagalur from August to January 2018. We issued certificates in collaboration Nehru Yuva Kendra, Chikmagalur to all trainees and also prizes were given to the three best performers.

Driving and 4-Wheeler mechanism: The 1st batch of Driving and 4-wheeler mechanism was organized in collaboration with Don Bosco Technical Institute, Hassan from April-August at Magge. Certificates and Driving licenses were issued on the completion of the course. The 2nd batch was organized in collaboration with Jaya Motors, Mudigere from October-February 2018. Certificates and Driving licenses were issued to the 15 dropout youth.

Soft Skills: We have also organized 24 training on EDP(Entrepreneurship Development programme), Life skills, Women Rights, Gender-Equity, Health, Government schemes and labour laws. This has increased their confidence to become self-reliant.

Skill-Net Groups : To organize the unorganised skilled sector, FVTRS in collaboration with its 76 partners, formed a platform called Skill-net India.

We have formed 47 skill-net groups in Hassan and Chikmagalur. The skilled sector is now recognized by the labour department through these groups. This platform helps them to avail labour cards, Government facilities and undergo training programmes from the department. The regular savings in these groups totals to Rs 26,85,000. Now they are motivated to invest in the shares of the Skill-net India company.

Mujesin Naz of Kadur Taluk with her two daughters, was forced to step out of the house after her husband's demise. Illiteracy and religious restrictions were her greatest challenges. With the support of CMSSS' staff, she enrolled into the 6 month garment making course at Beerur. Her interest and dire need helped her to learn the trade quickly. Trainings on life skills, EDP, Women rights, Government schemes showed new paths for her future. She invested her SHG savings in a tailoring machine and started stitching uniforms, clothes and dresses from home. Today she earns a monthly profit of 6000 and her daughters are continuing their education. Mujesin says that she wants to learn fashion designing.



INTEGRATED CHILD DEVELOPMENT

14 years • 1 project • 2 districts

Caritas Prague, Czech Republic

The primary objective of this project is to provide long time financial support for the education of poor children right from the age of 6 years up to completion of education.

The Child Sponsorship program was started in the year of 2003 with help of Caritas Prague of Czech Republic under the leadership of Fr. Peter Brank. Initially the program started with 25 poor and needy children from Hassan. Every year help was extended to more and more children with the help of the funding agency.

In 14 years, 347 children have benefited from this program and 176 children have already graduated the program by completing their education and becoming self-reliant. Every year Children are given orientations on life skills, motivational workshops, Educational tours, career guidance and personality development. Between 2013 to 2016 Rs 60,05,371 have been disbursed as educational aid to children. At present,171 children are supported through the project across Hassan and Chikmagalur.

2017-18

Summer Camp: Summer camp was organized in the month of May. 120 children participated. Skill development and Time management were the major focus of the camp. Little children were taken out for an exhibition in Hassan Town. Cultural events were organized to exhibit their talents.

Makkalothsava 2017: On account of Children's day, a program called Makkalothsava-2017 was organized for CSP children with local children at Chikmagalur, Koppa and Hassan. Group dynamics, action songs and group games were taught to the children. 319 children participated in this program.

Christmas Get Together: The children along with their parents participated in the Christmas get together at Hassan and Balehonnur regions. Sports, games and cultural events were arranged. The winners were awarded prizes and Christmas gifts were distributed to all.

Educational Support: Rs 17,45,971 have been disbursed among children as per the educational need.

Schools under CMSSS:

CMSSS supports 6 rural schools with institutional support.

Educational Aid to Boardings

37 students of Nirmala Boarding are supported through Madre Teresa ONG of Spain for their school fees, uniforms and stationary.

Kishore's father was a farmer and mother worked as a housemaid. The unsteady income forced Kishore to drop his education after SSLC. Kishore's mother joined a SHG of CMSSS to support her family. Kishore was enrolled into Child development program in 2003. He continued his studies and was an active participant in all the camps and trainings. He was supported to pay for his school fees, books, stationery, uniform, etc. He has completed his masters in social work and shifted to Bengaluru with his parents. Presently he works for St John's Hospital. and earns 25,000 per month.


